* share something about his religious belief, the existence of God and punishment.



Read the Dialogue:

- A: Do you believe in God who rewards good and punishes wrong-doing?
- B: Well, I'm an **agnostic**. I don't know whether or not God exists, but if there is God, I hope He doesn't punish wrong-doing.
- A: We punish murderers and rapists on Earth, so why shouldn't the same people **rot** in hell?
- B: Because I'd prefer to discover an understanding God than God of **vengeance**.
- A: But everybody is free to choose between right and wrong.
- B: I happen to believe that our choices can be traced back to their causes, some **hereditary** and some environmental.
- A: But if you followed that line to its logical **conclusion**, you'd **pardon** all criminals.
- B: Not at all.
- A: Then why shouldn't God send evil people to hell?
- B: I would agree with you if the purpose of hell was to **rehabilitate** people, but hell is usually associated with torture.
- A: But God gives people second chances. None of us is perfect.
- B: But we can't help what we are. I still maintain that an understanding God would prefer rehabilitation to torture.
